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Laura's Blind—Abilene State Park

Laura Packer and the Big Country Audubon Society dreamed and planned for a long time about putting a bird blind at Abilene State Park. Because of state park regulations concerning placement of anything new in parks, it took many tries and proposals before a site was finally chosen and accepted. Laura spearheaded those efforts. Not only did she search for a possible location in the park, but she, along with other members, visited other state parks where there were bird blinds.

She also had a quandary: would birds be attracted to the area that was chosen? It was Laura's nature

to put feet to her wonderings, so she hung bird feeders to check it out. "If you feed them, they will come," proved to be true---they came. In the meantime, she decided for better light, especially for photographing, the blind should be put across the lane where viewers would look north toward the birds.

Abilene Portable Buildings was chosen to build the 8x12 building with many windows for bird viewing. Their truck brought the completed building to the site, squeezed down the narrow lane leading to the location, and gently unloaded it. Several Audubon members were there to witness this momentous occasion. However, this was only the beginning.

John English began putting his ideas for a water feature with a solar powered pump in place, and after a great deal of effort, it was a completed project. He did this in spite of the fact that there is no water source nor pump power at the blind. In the meantime, Laura was furnishing the place with feeders,

feed, and tools to maintain. Her work didn't stop, though, and she made many trips to make sure the birds were fed.

A work day was held to build benches, paint, and build a fence. Audubon members turned out to assist in those endeavors.

It soon became apparent that squirrels and other critters whose homes the blind invaded were going to

be a problem. Other members stepped up to help solve the issue. W. K. Wiggins constructed poles on which the feeders could be hung. Unfortunately, because squirrels excel in acrobatics, they can climb the poles faster then a person can blink. The problem still exists and there is a crop of very fat squirrels who continue to feast on the seeds put out for the birds.

When Laura's health became critical, it was evident that assistance was needed to keep up the bird blind so it would continue to be a vital part of the park offerings. Many members stepped up and agreed to maintain the blind on week ends. Harry Dhans, Linda Beyer, and Bera Johnson maintain regular weekly schedules to help. John continues to maintain the water feature, and Larry and Donna Barnett who live near the park assist often. Lorie Black's brother fixed a rain barrel for the blind.

Seeing the beautiful Northern Cardinals, frisky Black Crested Titmouses, Carolina Chickadees, Painted Buntings, Spotted Towhees, Carolina Wrens, Red-Breasted Nuthatches, woodpeckers, many migratory birds, and various others has sparked interest in birding among ones who come to watch.

Every effort by each and every member has made continuing to keep bird watching at the blind a vital experience at Abilene State Park. Plus, many of God's wonderful feathered creatures (and a few furry ones!) are attracted to and thriving on our offerings day after day, year after year.
